WHAT'S THE JOB ABOUT?

- Operating one or more machines as part of a team on a production line in a clothing factory. The range of jobs that turn material into a finished garment include:
 - PATTERN MAKING Master patterns are produced from design sketches often using Computer Aided Design (CAD) packages. The master pattern is then graded to produce a set of patterns in different sizes.
 - SPECIFICATION Details of how the garment is to be made are set out on a specification sheet.
 - o CUTTING Copies of the garment pattern are arranged on multiple layers of cloth. Pieces of the garment are cut out using electric saws or lasers.
 - o MATERIAL HANDLING / BUNDLING Parts of garments are sorted according to style, size and colour and stacked and bundled for the machinists.
 - GARMENT MAKING Sewing machinists assemble garment pieces and attach zippers and pockets. Each machinist sews one part of the garment or may make through the whole garment.







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- o TRIMMING The garment is hemmed and buttons, elastic, hooks and eyelets attached.
- o PRESSING Garments are pressed using heat, steam, vacuum and pressure depending on the fabric and garment type.
- o PRODUCT EXAMINATION Work is examined both during and after manufacture for faults and sizes are checked against tickets and labels.
- o QUALITY CONTROL Final garments are checked against the specification sheets.
- Dressmakers are experienced in all of the stages of clothing production, fit and make customised garments for individuals and carry out repairs and alterations.
- Tailoring involves the manufacture of clothing for formal and business wear and uniforms.

WORK CONDITIONS

- Clothing production workers work indoors in a factory or small business.
- Hours are usually set and overtime and shift work may be required.
- Workers may encounter Occupational Health and Safety issues such as noise and machines with many moving and sharp parts.
- Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) is provided as necessary.
- Some routine maintenance or adjustment of the machinery may be required.
- Piece workers carry out a range of the above tasks from their home or business.
- Most large scale clothing production has moved offshore and opportunities exist for overseas employment as supervisors and managers.
- Dressmakers may work independently from home, in a small designer's studio or for formal wear hire companies and outlets.
- Independent dress makers work their own hours and set their own rates according to the type of garment, repair or alteration.
- Small business management skills are essential for the successful operation of a small clothing production business.







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EXPERIENCE AND RELATED TRAINING

- Training and induction of operators is usually provided on the job.
- Some employers may map an individual skill development plan for each operator.
- Gaining a formal qualification will help you to develop the knowledge and skills that you need to progress in the clothing production industry.
- If you are already working at this level you can have your skills recognised by applying for a qualification with a training provider.
- Significant and relevant industry experience is essential at each level of management.
- Offshore work often requires proficiency in the language of the host country.
