29 May 2025 Visit to Waverley Mill, Launceston

On 28 May 2025, a total of seven young brokers from AWN SA, Nutrien Bendigo, Westcoast Wools WA, Fox & Lillie Rural NSW & Vic, flew into Launceston. We gathered early Thursday morning and travelled to Waverley Mill where we met Penny Rundle, Partnerships & Growth. Penny spoke about the history of the mill which commenced in 1874 and is still in operation today. A tour of the mill followed with Penny explaining every process that wool undertakes from greasy wool to the beautiful finished blankets and throws. Our brokers were amazed at the number of processes wool goes through from scouring, to dyeing, spinning, weaving, finishing and finally packing the beautiful products to send out to customers. (The only process not undertaken by Waverley Mills is the scouring of greasy wool. However, this is still done in Australia).

Now back in Melbourne, we had an early start at the AWTA Testing Laboratory in Kensington. Four young brokers from Elders joined the program in Melbourne & Geelong. Tim Steere greeted us on arrival. Although some had previously been on an AWTA tour they were still impressed to see new testing equipment recently introduced to provide more data on the test certificates or requests from clients. There were lots of questions along the way but the biggest concern was the drop in wool production going forward. As we were guided through the facility, Tim explained every process from receivals of raw wool, the various tests from yield & fibre diameter, staple length and strength, fleece measurement, colour of greasy wool, pesticides residues, DMFR scheme, the robots and more. Thanks Tim for your time, the brokers thoroughly enjoyed your tour.

### **Next stop - Geelong.**

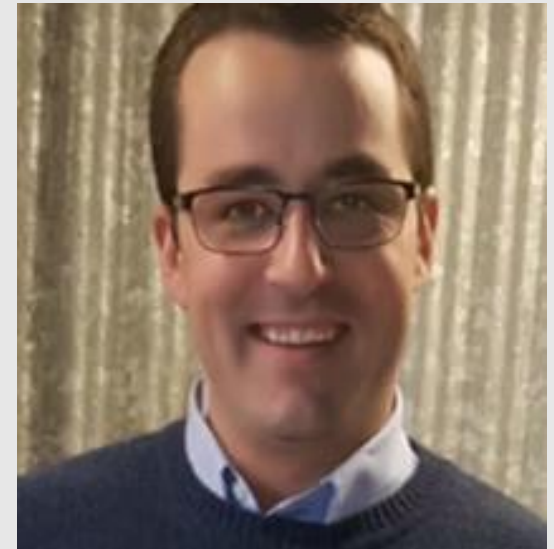

- \* What is policy and the policy development process
- \* Key policy issues:
  - Biosecurity including Traceability (sheep and AWTH), EADRA and EAD preparedness
  - Welfare
  - Sustainability
  - Trade
  - Sheep Sustainability Framework and Trust In Australian Wool
- The logical alignment between WPA and NCWSBA

The group were presented with the “Trust in Australian Wool” and the Australian Sheep Sustainability Framework Handbooks.

## Dinner & presentations . Special guests invited

Jim Robinson from EP Robinson, Geelong - early stage wool processor.

EP Robinson Pty Limited is a commission wool processing company specialising in the scouring and carbonising of all grades of Australian wool for the global worsted and woollen trade. He explained the process of early stage wool processing and difference between scouring and carbonising of greasy wool . Also what happens with wool grease which is a sought after by-product. He touched on the history of early stage processing in Australia and that there are now only two companies left in Australia and most of the early and late stage processing is now done in China, India and some in Europe.

Evan Croake - Techwool - Major Wool Exporter. - The Role of the Wool Exporter

Evan explained that exporters will source greasy wool (all micron types) direct from wool-growers through its extensive buying network, and at major auction centres around Australia. They work closely with wool brokers to ensure they purchase wool that is sought after by their clients in Australia and overseas. He also covered the topics of Logistics and Transportation, Quality Assurance, Risk Management, Facilitating Processing, Navigating Trade Regulations, Supporting Woolgrowers, Connecting to Global Markets, Technological Advancements, Focus on Sustainability and more.

The young brokers gained a lot of knowledge from his presentation and understanding the complexity of the exporters role in the wool trade.

## 3 June 2025 Visit to LoomTex Geelong

Samantha Van Zyl, CEO provided a history and overview of their operations in Geelong. LoomTex is an Australian textile mill + dye house, the fusion of Geelong Dyeing, Geelong Weaving Mill & Geelong Textiles. LoomTex manufactures a wide range of textiles with applications for commercial and residential interiors, apparel and technical areas such as Defence, Aerospace and Fire & Emergency Services

LoomTex has partnerships with Deakin University's Institute of Frontier Materials, RMIT, University of Melbourne & CSIRO to foster innovative, sustainable fibres & textiles.

She is very passionate about the business, it's future and the partnerships that have been created to support the wool industry in Australia.

Andrew then took us through the processing of the wool through to weaving. The young brokers were amazed at the number of different process the wool has to go through to get to the end product.

## 3 June 2025 Visit to Australian Research Council Future Fibres Hub

Our young brokers were welcomed by Dr Matt Boyd, Hub Manager and Associate Professor Chris Hurren, Protective Textiles and Textiles Engineering who spoke on the development of the Hub. The ARC Research Hub for Future Fibres utilises the capabilities of Deakin's Institute for Frontier Materials by connecting with Industry Partners to solve real world problems. It harnesses the unique capabilities of the largest and most advanced fibre research group in the Southern Hemisphere, for research across the whole fibre value chain. Their focus is on sustainability, circular economics and extraordinary functionality.

The young brokers were excited to see the latest project "Mud to Marle". This project is an Australian initiative focused on transforming low-value, mud-matted wool into high-quality yarn and fabric for fashion. The Mud to Marle demonstrates the potential for:

**Circular economy:** Repurposing waste materials.

**Onshore manufacturing:** Producing textiles entirely within Australia.

**Low-impact production:** Minimizing environmental impact through resource-efficient methods.

**Sustainable fashion:** Creating high-quality, ethically produced garments.

At the end of the 2 hour tour we met to review the program and highlights. We also discussed the process for "The Young Broker of the Year Award", how to apply, what the judges look for and so on.
